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- (16) Prior to construction of the Operation and Maintenance Facility and concrete batch plant, the Applicant must provide a detailed Site Plan of the Operation and Maintenance facility pursuant to Section 509 of the Perquimans County Zoning Ordinance. Included in the Site Plan, the Applicant must comply with Article XIX Parking and Loading of the Perquimans County Zoning Ordinance. Where applicable, all handicapped parking spaces shall be marked in accordance with State law.
- (17) A separate Sign Permit must be obtained from the Planning & Zoning Office and the Building Inspections Department for any sign not exempted by the Perquimans County Zoning ordinance, Article XX.
- (18) The Applicant shall establish a method to receive and address complaints and concerns from area residents and the general public through the construction process and throughout the operating life of the Project.
- (19) During construction of the project, the Applicant shall provide the County with annual reports outlining progress to date along with circumstances that may result in delays. If the Conditional Use Permit is not recorded within 12 months from the date of BCC approval, the BCC may revoke the Conditional Use Permit
- (20) Cultural Resources: The Applicant shall submit a copy of any inventory, study, plan, etc., required or prepared by State or Federal regulations or agencies which documents historical or archaeological resources found within the project boundaries.

The Board discussed the condition to require the applicant to come before the Planning Board and Board of Commissioners if there is any movement of the turbines. The Staff looked at several ways to measure this and comply with what the Planning Board desired and they could not find one. He said that there were several ways to handle this: (1) accept what the Planning Board recommended; (2) rely on the setbacks; and (3) try to come up with some kind of measurement to require that it come back before the Board. Petitioner's Attorney, Henry Campen, Jr., said that the Boards had determined the setbacks at the adoption of the Ordinance and feels that there is probably going to be some movement of the turbines depending upon Corps of Engineer's reports and feels that having to come back to the Boards would mean a lot more work and more meetings like this to resolve the issue. Commissioner Nixon does not feel that we have the resources to monitor these things any way. He feels that we should adhere to the setbacks in the Ordinance. Craig Poff said that there are residents all along this property and moving it from one place to another may affect another resident. He further stated that he will do everything to work with the landowners when building these turbines. Vice Chair Cole asked if Commissioner Nixon was willing to amend the motion to approve the Conditional Use Permit with the changes that County Manager Darden had presented on Condition No. 5 and Condition No. 1. Commissioner Nixon said that he would like to leave the Ordinance with the understanding that we have setbacks and it is not necessary to drag this process through both Boards again if they have to move one of the turbines a certain number of feet. Commissioner Nixon amended the motion with this change to the Condition No. 1 and the change to Condition 5. Commissioner Miller-White seconded the amended motion. Vice Chair Cole asked for a vote. The amended motion was unanimously approved by the Board. Petitioner's Attorney Campen, Jr. asked for clarification of the changes to Condition No. 1 and Condition No. 5. After some discussion, the Board left the wording of these Conditions to the attorneys and County Manager Darden.

ADJOURNMENT

There being no further comments or business to discuss, the Regular Meeting was adjourned by the Chairman at 7:50 p.m.

The Perquimans County Board of Commissioners met in a Special Called Meeting on Monday, June 27, 2011 at 6:00 p.m. in the upstairs Courtroom of the Perquimans County Courthouse Annex Building. The purpose of the meeting was to hold Public Hearings for the NCDOT Secondary Road Improvement Program and the FY 2011-2012 Budget.

Chairman Hobbs called the meeting to order and asked Commissioner Miller-White to give the invocation. The Chairman then led the Pledge of Allegiance. Chairman Hobbs explained that, the purpose of this meeting tonight was to hold two Public Hearings – one for NCDOT Secondary Road Improvement Program and one for FY 2011-2012 Budget.

AGENDA

The Agenda, as amended, was unanimously approved on motion made by Mack E. Nixon, seconded by Tammy Miller-White.

PUBLIC HEARINGS

NCDOT Secondary Road Meeting

Chairman Hobbs opened the first Public Hearing stating that the purpose of the public hearing was to receive public comments on the proposed County's 2011-2012 Secondary Road Improvement Program. There were six (6) people present. The Chairman recognized Sterling Baker, Division Maintenance Engineer, who introduced his staff as follows: Ronnie Sawyer, County Maintenance Engineer, and Kenny White, Transportation Supervisor in Perquimans County. Mr. Baker proceeded to explain that he was presenting the FY 2011-2011 Secondary Road Improvement Program. The actual allocation for FY 2011-2012 was \$427,988.81. He reviewed the status of previously funded projects. Commissioner Nixon informed Mr. Baker that Charney Umphlett Road is now named Powers Lane. The following questions were asked from the Board and public:

- ➤ Commissioner Miller-White: Ms. Miller-White asked that, out of the funding to-date, \$620,000 has already been set aside for the pavement of 2.63 miles of New Hope Road (SR 1300) but nothing has moved forward on the project yet. Mr. Baker said that the only thing that has been done is survey work and obtained the right-of-ways. No construction work has been done on the project yet.
- > Commissioner Nixon: Mr. Nixon stated that last year a gentleman asked NCDOT about a road in Snug Harbor, Spruce Lane, a cut-through street in Snug Harbor that was not a State Road but the School buses use it on a regular basis. He asked

if there was anything that can be done about that situation. Mr. Baker said that at this time nothing can be done. He further stated that, if all other qualifications existed, the bus traffic will add points to its paving. Mr. White said that they sympathize with his situation but there is nothing that they can do. Mr. Nixon said that the individual has tried to get help from the Homeowners Association, but has not received any assistance from them. Mr. Nixon said that his point was that, if there was no traffic going through there, this individual would not have the pot holes that are there.

- Commissioner Muzzulin: Mr. Muzzulin asked about the deterioration of Burnt Mill Road. Mr. Baker said that he was on that road recently and agreed that it had deteriorated. Mr. Sawyer could better address when NCDOT plans to resurface the road. Mr. Sawyer said that it was not on this year's project but it is on a later year list. Mr. Baker said that the bridge on Burnt Mill Road is one of the bridges that are scheduled to be replaced.
- > Commissioner Miller-White: Ms. Miller-White asked that, when you said "Awaiting Spending Authority", what is the anticipated date. Mr. Baker explained he could not give you a date but he should better be able to answer that question after all the Secondary Road Improvement Programs have been presented to his 14 counties in his district. Ms. Miller-White asked if it is contingent upon the funding review which should be completed in the fall. Mr. Baker agreed.
- > Commissioner Cole: Ms. Cole asked about the Churches Lane which was discussed last year. Commissioner Nixon said that Mr. Winslow was in the audience and has asked to speak. Mr. Baker said that they have investigated that several times and there are still a couple who have not signed the right-of-way.

 Arnold Winslow: Mr. Winslow asked about Churches Lane. He said that Mr. William Bundy came to the meeting last
- year and agreed to sign the paperwork giving NCDOT the proper right-of-way. Mr. Winslow said that he had contacted Mr. Bundy a couple of days ago and Mr. Bundy said that no one from NCDOT had been there to talk with him. Mr. Baker said that he had been contacted but he would check into it for him. He further stated that it was his understanding that he was not the only property owner that had not signed over the right of way. Mr. Baker said that he would get that information to Bobby Darden. He asked Mr. Sawyer to get contact information from Mr. Winslow so that Mr. Baker can send the updated information to him also.
- > County Manager Darden: Mr. Darden asked that according to your Subdivision List, after these few roads to be handled in July are completed, there are no more subdivision roads remaining to be paved. Mr. Baker agreed unless some more are added.
- > Emerson Cullings: Mr. Cullings asked about Sassafras Street in Snug Harbor. He wanted to know when it would be completed because it has been on the list for about 5 years. Mr. Baker said that he could not locate it on his list. It has been graveled several times but it has not been paved yet. He will have to check on this and let Mr. Darden know the status. > Chairman Hobbs: Mr. Hobbs commented on Pender Road and how it is coming apart.
- > Commissioner Weimar: Ms. Weimar asked when NCDOT will be coming to Snug Harbor again to repair the aprons in the subdivision. Mr. White said that he usually handled these jobs on rainy days. He could not promise when he would be there but will get there as soon as possible.
- ➤ A. O. Roberts: Mr. Roberts asked that, when they agreed to the right-of-way on Powers Lane, they asked that a bridge be placed from the road across the ditch to the farm and made it a part of their agreement. Mr. Roberts wanted to make sure that NCDOT was going to comply with his request. Mr. Baker said that, if it was written into the Agreement, NCDOT
- would comply but normally that is not included.

 > County Manager Darden: Mr. Darden asked that if NCDOT was going to replace the upper Perquimans River bridge in the Whiteston area. Mr. Baker asked if that was the bridge up from the railroad bridge. Mr. Darden said that it was. Mr. Baker said that it was schedule to be replaced. Mr. Darden verified that this will not come from the County's funds. Mr. Baker said that it comes from a separate budget.

 Commissioner Miller-White: Ms. Miller-White asked when they will be repaying Hog Neck Road. Mr. White said that it
- would probably be next year or the year after.
- > Commissioner Nixon: Mr. Nixon asked what the problem was with the pavement at the bridge. Mr. Baker said that it was
- slipping. He further stated that they have discussed this many times with Barnhill.

 > Commissioner Muzzulin: Mr. Muzzulin asked if the price of oil and asphalt affects their budget. Mr. Baker said that it affects if by a fair amount. He cited various examples.
- > Chairman Hobbs: Mr. Hobbs asked what was the criteria between tar & rock or resurfacing the road. Mr. Baker said that they use this in areas with less traffic and come back in about 5 years and resurface the road.
- > Commissioner Nixon: Mr. Nixon asked that they not pave with less than 11/2" pavement. That is what they did on White Hat Road. It wasn't long before it cracked and fell apart and grass began to grow in it. If they don't have money to do it right, keep the funds for next year and add some to it and do it right the first time.
- Commissioner Weimar: Ms. Weimar asked, of the 14 counties in his district, how many have DOT facilities within the county. Mr. Baker said that he has 14 counties that are divided into 3 districts. Each district has 2 County maintenance facilities. Camden does not have a maintenance facility. All the much larger counties have at least one facility except Bertie County which has two - one in Ahoskie and one in Windsor. She asked about our Maintenance Facility here in Perquimans and who it serves. Mr. Baker said that it serves just Perquimans.

There being no further questions or comments from the Board and/or public, the Chairman stated that they would have to wait until 7:00 p.m. to hold the next Public Hearing.

FY 2011-2012 Budget

Chairman Hobbs opened the second Public Hearing stating that the purpose of the public hearing was to receive public comments on the proposed FY 2011-2012 Budget. There were six (6) people present. The Chairman recognized County Manager Bobby Darden who distributed copies of the changes to the Budget that was presented at the June 6, 2011 meeting. Those changes were as follows:

General Fund - Department of Social Services

sayings to the General Fund, however the FY 10-11 Budget was overspent by approximately	

\$3,000 for Contract Services, which is mainly grass mowing and landscaping work. I am proposing to reduce the Contract Work line item from \$27,000 to \$25,000. I'm proposing to increase the Juvenile Detention line item from \$3,000 to \$5,000 to budget closer to actual expenses in FY 10-11.

Solid Waste Fund

• Increase Fund Balance Appropriated Revenue (38-399-000)	\$5,000

EXPLANATION: To pay for Convenience Center Sites contracting mowing services from the Solid Waste Fund and not General Fund.

County Construction Fund

 Increase Capital Outlay – Furniture Expense (50-000-720) 	\$65,000
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EXPLANATION: The original budget did not include any EMS furniture for the new facility. This is based on an EMS estimate.

Chairman Hobbs explained that County Manager Darden wants to schedule a time for the Board to take a tour of the Albemarle Electric Membership Building to get an idea of where this money is being spent. The Board discussed the taking of current furniture to the new building. Mr. Darden said that most of the furniture will be going to the new building but with the EMS part, we currently did not have any bunk beds or overnight provisions so they have to purchase new items for that. Commissioner Miller-White concurred and said that most of the furniture at the EMS building has lived its useful life. Chairman Hobbs stated that only one individual had asked for speak on the budget. The following comments/questions were made:

- Alan Barnes: Mr. Barnes is a retired senior citizen in Snug Harbor whose income has not increased but his expenses have increased. His question to the Board was do they have a plan to live within their means. He said that at the last assessments the property values went up. He is not sure when the next assessment is scheduled but he feels that, if they are done fairly, the values will fall. Does the County have a Strategic Plan in place to overcome this shortfall? His concern is that this may be the first step to raising rates to overcome the reduction in assessed values. Chairman Hobbs said that Perquimans County has chosen to reassess every 8 years. County Manager Darden said that, by law, 8 years is the maximum time between revaluations. He further stated that it would be impossible to set up a revenue plan because so much of the County's revenues are volatile such as sales tax, land transfer tax, building inspection fees, interest earnings, etc. These revenues are economy based. It is difficult if not impossible to predict what these incomes will be. With regard to the revaluations, Mr. Darden said that, if we were to revaluate now so that it would reflect a more accurate rate, it would cost the County \$400,000. In order to pay for this, the County would have to increase the tax rate a couple of cents to cover the \$400,000. Also, with the reduction of the revaluation rate, the tax rate would be adjusted upward to cover the shortfall. He stated that when the revaluations went up the tax rate was \$.67/\$100 valuation of property to \$.41/\$100 valuation of property. Chairman Hobbs said that at the time of revaluation Mr. Darden had to determine what the revenue neutral rate was which was determined to be \$.40/100 valuation of property. The Board decided to set the rate at \$.41/\$100 valuation of property. It remained at \$.41/\$100 for two years and last year we increased it to \$.42/\$100 valuation of property. Mr. Hobbs further stated that we have the 11th lowest tax rate in the state.
- ➤ Commissioner Cole: Ms. Cole asked about the Office of Juvenile Justice line item in the Budget and in the Budget Ordinance. They did not match. Mr. Darden explained that several of the line items combine figures on the Budget Ordinance.
- > Commissioner Miller-White: Ms. Miller-White had several question. The first question had to do with the e-mails that we had received regarding an increase in the Library Budget to cover medical insurance for an employee in the amount of \$5,112. She said that the Library Fund had not increased for the last 3 years and that she felt that because this is a unique situation, the Board needs to revisit this and consider increasing their budget by \$5,112. County Manager Darden explained that he had included e-mails from the Perquimans County Librarian and the Regional Director of Pettigrew Library. Commissioner Cole asked that, since she had not been here for the past three years, how does this compare to the other funds. Ms. Miller-White said that she was comparing it to the School Budget but they have received an increase but the Library's funds are being cut this year by the state. Commissioner Muzzulin asked how many employees are in this type of situation. Mr. Darden said that there are several that could participate in our insurance but chose to be included in their spouse's insurance. Commissioner Cole said that she was trying to understand the situation in that the County is responsible for all employees' insurance. Mr. Darden said that was correct. She wants to understand the relationship between the library employees and the county employees. Mr. Darden said that the Library does receive State funding but we provide them a facility and space for them. We also provide them, as we do the schools, with some operating income. Ms. Cole asked if the Library and the School System were the only two departments that fall into this category. Mr. Darden said that Extension is probably close to this type of funding. Finance Officer, Sharon Ward, asked about what the other counties are doing in a situation like this. Commissioner Cole asked where Mr. Darden would pull the funds to cover this. Mr. Darden said from the General Fund and he would recommend Fund Balance reserves. Bob Bastek, representative from the Library
- was to cover the water clerk's salary & benefits along with any other overhead expenses for this area.

 > Commissioner Muzzulin: Mr. Muzzulin asked what the Farm Rent was. Mr. Darden explained that it is the income from the crops at the Commerce Centre and a small farm off Lake Road behind the Winfall Fire Department. He also asked what the Revenue Item "Utility Franchise Distribution" included. Mr. Darden explained that it was the cable TV franchise.

There being no further questions or comments from the Board and/or public, the Chairman closed the Public Hearing at 7:28 p.m. and proceeded with the Special Called Meeting.

HOME & COMMUNITY CARE BLOCK GRANT (HCCBG)

County Manager Darden presented the Home & Community Care Block Grant for FY 2011-2012 totaling \$176,996. This is administered through Albemarle Commission and is reflected in the Social Services Budget. Tammy Miller-White made a motion to accept these funds and Sue Weimar seconded the motion. Commissioner Cole asked about the Annual Expenditures listed on page 6 of the contract. There is nothing listed for \$25,000 – just < \$25,000 and > \$25,000. County Manager Darden said that we would check into that. Commissioner Miller-White amended her motion to include a request to correct this error. Commissioner Weimar seconded the amended motion. The amended motion was unanimously approved accepting the HCCBG Grant funding for FY 2011-2012 totaling \$176,996.

MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT: INSURANCE BENEFITS FOR AMHC QUALIFIED RETIREES

County Manager Darden explained that he had received an e-mail from Russell Overman, Martin County Manager, stating that they have obtained coverage for all of the retirees. It is Mr. Overman's understanding that we are paying between \$25 and \$1,300 per month for coverage. Mr. Darden explained that the AMHC Counties agreed to this about a year ago when AMHC officially dissolved and East Carolina Behavioral Health formally took over. Basically, these funds were held for the retirement

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benefits for Tideland and Albemarle Mental Health employees that retired from these organizations. AMHC was financially obligated to provide those post-retirement benefits to those employees. There was a question as to how this was going to be funded. The State was kind enough to put \$500,000 into a fund held by Martin County to pay the retirement benefits until these individuals are no long eligible for the benefits. Mr. Darden believes that it is until age 65 when Medicare picks up. Commissioner Nixon asked if they have a supplement to the Medicare that needs to be paid for. Mr. Darden said that he thought that they would have a supplement until they die but the premiums would be lower than the regular coverage. Martin County has requested this Agreement to be signed by all the Counties involved.

MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT PROVISION OF HEALTH INSURANCE BENEFITS for QUALIFIED RETIREES OF ALBEMARLE MENTAL HEALTH and TIDELAND MENTAL HEALTH

WHEREAS, July 1, 2007 four counties from Tideland Mental Health (Tideland) merged with the six counties comprising Albemarle Mental Health (Albemarle); and

WHEREAS, certain qualified employees retired from Albemarle and Tideland and therefore were and are entitled to post retirement health insurance benefits as set forth in policies approved by the Boards of each of those agencies; and

WHEREAS, neither Albemarle or Tideland is an ongoing entity; and

CAMDEN COUNTY

WHEREAS, the ten counties that were the remaining member counties of Albemarle Mental Health upon its dissolution are Camden, Chowan, Currituck, Dare, Hyde, Martin, Pasquotank, Perquimans, Tyrrell and Washington; and

WHEREAS, funds were provided by Tideland at the time of merger for the purpose of funding the post retirement health insurance benefits for qualified Tideland employees and funds were provided by the State of North Carolina at the time of dissolution to assist with the funding of these benefits for both Albemarle and Tideland retirees; and

WHEREAS, Martin County has agreed to handle the administration of providing the retiree health insurance and therefore Martin County has possession of the funds available for same and Martin county is willing to do so for no compensation but also has no individual liability to provide these benefits in the event the funds set aside for this purpose are exhausted; and

WHEREAS, Martin County will provide a financial report to each of the county managers no later than July 31st each year which will include at a minimum the beginning balance of the fund, charges to the fund and the ending balance of the fund; and

WHEREAS, in the event the funds are exhausted prior to the retirees no longer being eligible for coverage the counties will determine what action to take and if it is to make up the shortfall it shall be done on a per capita basis for each county; and

WHEREAS, the county managers of each county are collectively given the authority to make any necessary administrative decisions regarding these funds with the exception of decisions regarding funds being exhausted.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that each of the counties named below evidenced by the signature of the Chairman of the Board of Commissioners hereby agrees to the recitals above regarding the provision of post retirement health insurance benefits to those eligible former employees of Albemarle Mental Health and Tideland Mental Health.

Commissioner Miller-White asked how the funds will be invested and hoped that they would not invest it into risky investments. Mr. Darden said that since it is being managed by Martin County, they have to adhere to Local Government Commission standards. It is very limited to how they can invest those funds. Commissioner Nixon asked if they received any financials from them this past year to know what the balance is. Mr. Darden said that we had not. Mr. Nixon said that before the Board makes a decision on this Agreement we should know the balance in this account. He further stated that that they promised to give financial reports every year by July 31st but what about the current year - did

we get a report. Mr. Darden said that Martin County has asked that we give them a decision by July 1st but he knows that some of the Boards will not be able to meet prior to July 1st. Commissioner Muzzulin asked how did this situation come about. Chairman Hobbs, County Manager Darden, and Commissioner Nixon explained that, when Tideland merged with AMHC, the employees were assured that their retirement benefits would stand. Without the approval of the full Board, the contract was amended by the directors and AMHC moved this money to the General Fund. Commissioner Cole asked, without this Agreement, who will administer this fund. Mr. Darden said that Martin County would continue to administer the fund. It was the consensus of the Board to table the matter until the July 5th meeting and have County Manager Darden find out the balance in the fund.

Section 1: There is hereby levied a tax at the rate of <u>44 ¢</u> (<u>forty four</u>) per one hundred dollars (\$100) valuation of property listed for taxes as of January 1, 2011 for the purpose of raising the revenue listed as "Budget Year's Taxes" in the General Fund - Part I, Section 2 of this Ordinance.

Section 2: This rate of tax is based on an estimated total valuation of property for the purpose of taxation of \$1,626,715,116 and an estimated collection rate of 96.12%.

This Budget was approved with a vote of six (6) to zero (0) on June 27, 2011 by a quorum of the Perquimans County Board of Commissioners being present and all present casting a vote.

If all violations have not been corrected, a final notice shall be issued and an additional thirty-five dollar (\$35.00) fee shall be imposed. Seven (7) days following the issuance of the final notice, the fire official shall return for a re-inspection. If all violations have not been corrected and all fees paid at this time a two hundred dollar (\$200.00) fine shall be imposed and criminal proceedings shall be initiated by the fire official, if necessary, to bring the establishment within compliance with the fire code.
